Annie G. Page, the daughter of the late Jacob Elijah and Annie V. Tatum, is a native of Bay Springs, MS, Jasper County, and an active member of the Jerusalem Missionary Baptist Church of the Lake Como Community in Bay Springs, MS, where she is Church clerk, Trustee Secretary, and has been a member of the musician staff for more than 40 years.

Annie is a 1964 graduate of Bay Springs Vocational High School and a 1967 graduate of Mississippi Valley State University, earning a BA degree in Elementary Education, and later earned a Masters Degree in Education from Mississippi State University. Annie also received an AAA Certification in Elementary Supervision, Counseling, Elementary Principal and Administration at the University of Southern Mississippi and William Carey University, She served in the East Jasper County School District for 26 years, as Assistant Principal at Nora Davis Magnet School, Laurel, MS, and as Principal at Gardiner Middle School, Laurel, MS. After retiring from the Laurel School District in June 2001, Annie was led her back to Heidelberg as Lead Supervisor with the Education and Training Institute, assisting school dropouts and adults in seeking GEDs and JOB Training. Through this program many students attended college, became employable, and some even became entrepreneurs.



In 2005, Annie transitioned to Jones County Junior College to work in the same capacity as the Education and Training Institute Program, with a satellite computer lab site located in Laurel, MS.

When the Jones Junior College computer lab moved to Bay Springs, she transferred there to work with new clients.

Civically, Annie has served several terms as Secretary on the Jasper County Democratic Committee, and in other capacities with the Mississippi State Teacher's Association. In 2015, Annie became a Silver Lifetime member of the NAACP.




"Suited for Business"


18th Annual Women's History Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony

On March 10, 2017, Valerie D. Glenn, SED Recording Secretary and immediate past president of the Charlotte Club, was inducted into the Women's History Hall of Fame (WHHOF). Valerie was honored for her significant contributions to the community with almost 15 years of experience as an educator in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School system. She is joining a long list of other distinguished women who are trailblazers and whose contributions significantly impact the community. Their names, along with their outstanding Her-stories, are inscribed forever in the Women's History Hall of Fame.

Thereasea "TD" Elder, a charter member, Life member and WHHOF committee chairperson of the Charlotte Club, introduced the idea of the Women's History Hall of Fame as a venue to honor women during National Women's History Month. The Charlotte Club of NANBPWC, Inc., in partnership with the Levine Museum of the New South, jointly held the first induction ceremony on March 24, 2000. An induction ceremony has taken place annually since the first one.

Club Sister Kerry Rushin Miller
Honored as the First Black Female Undergraduate at UGA

The University of Georgia (UGA), Office of Institutional Diversity, realized her impact to the institution's civil rights movement when Charlotte Club Sister Kerry-Rushin Miller desegregated its campus in 1962.

Fifty years later, January 12, 2017, Club Sister Miller was called back on UGA's campus to talk about her undergraduate experience in personally addressing desegregation as the UGA's the first African America female freshman and received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Mathematics from UGA in 1966. One would agree that "that was a bitter sweet moment," however, Club Sister Miller used the experience as fuel to move forward and became the second African American female to be hired as an Engineering Associate at the Western Electric Regional Engineering Headquarters, Atlanta, Georgia. Her forward movement continued. In 1975, she was one of two females selected to join the Southern Bell management team in Charlotte, NC, where she retired 29 years later, in 1996.

In 2005, Club Sister Miller joined The Charlotte Club in 2005 and continued her momentum in community service as a tutor, a life skills coach, and a job readiness counselor for several non-profit agencies. Among her awards for her contributions to the Charlotte community were the Sojourner Truth Meritorious Award and The Charlotte Club Service Award.
